



Q&A from 02138... Matthew Martindale '14



(These interviews are a regular contribution to the HCSC Newsletter and will spotlight students enrolled at Harvard who are from Southern California. Nominations to profile students from our region are invited.)

Matthew Martindale '14, a concentrator in Economics, was born in Laguna Hills, California and graduated from Laguna Hills High School. He resides in Quincy House. At Harvard, he is a two-time Ivy League Champion who played Outside Linebacker for the Crimson football team. He played in nine games and finished sixth on the team with 41 tackles. At 6'0" and 225 pounds, Martindale has football in his gentetic profile. His grandfather played football at Holy Cross in 1952 and two uncles played

football at UCLA. He is also a member of the Phoenix S.K. on campus and enjoys volunteering in organizations such as Special Olympics and Access Sports. He spent last summer interning at MC10, a Cambridge-based startup specializing in flexible electronics. He is also interested in the worlds of biotechnology and medical devices and plans to pursue a career in those fields.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time? **MM:** Absolute wonder, from the ivy entangling the stadium to the grand columns at Widener, the place still feels like

MM: Absolute wonder, from the ivy entangling the stadium to the grand columns at Widener, the place still feels like a dreamland.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

MM: My favorite class thus far has actually occurred outside my field of concentration. I am currently taking an Engineering Sciences class involving the innovation of new and useful prototypes. It is extremely rewarding to be leading an innovative production pipeline instead of studying how the production functions interact with supply shocks.

HCSC: What has been your most memorable moment at Harvard?

MM: My most memorable moments have occurred across the river. The ones that stick out in my mind are the Dartmouth game played in two feet of snow, watching the basketball team win multiple championships, and taking Yale to the woodshed four years in a row. The Harvard-Yale rivalry is an amazing event rich in history and tra - dition. The emotion and tenacity of both teams elevate the game to new heights providing an exceptional platform to demonstrate a year's worth of work in front of 40,000 fans.

HCSC: How does Harvard's football program compare to other college teams you were considering?

MM: Harvard's football program stood out from other programs I was considering in the way they operated as a family. The coaches and staff presented a winning attitude from day one, but also wanted their student athletes to succeed of the field and in their future endeavors. I cannot express the full gratitude I have for being able to play for the Crimson.

HCSC: Any special memories (on or off the field) with your teammates?

MM: The summer preparing for our senior season, the team orchestrated a float trip with over 40 crimson and friends. We boarded a bus early in the morning and headed out to a river in western Massachusetts where we tube-floated all day and enjoyed some well-deserved time off. This simple escape from the work/athletic grind was a special day for all in atten - dance.

HCSC: What advice will you best remember from Coach Murphy?

MM: "Treat the little people with respect." Coach Murphy always emphasized respect, whether it was a dean of a visiting college or a janitor on an away game, we were expect - ed to treat them as one of our family members.

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard or Athletic Director, what would change?

MM: If I were President of Harvard University I would increase the enrollment of the college. Harvard University is a special place and I believe it should be shared with as many individuals as possible.

Each admissions season, alumni interviewers, under the leadership of our Club's Schools Committees, help the Admissions Office evaluate applicants to Harvard College. The Schools Committee is the Club's largest volunteering activity. Each year, over 700 graduates of Harvard College and graduate schools interview over 2,700 candidates from our region. In

the process, alumni participate in college fairs throughout the area and give presentations on Harvard, initiating and maintaining relationships with parents, guidance counselors, other alumni/ae, and the general public. Immediate Past President Daniel A. Medina, A.B. '79, M.B.A. '83 is our Club's vice pr esident for Schools, and he coordinates the Schools Committee's work with the area chairs who divide up the interview assignments among alumni and manage the operations for their geographic area. The newsletter will feature profiles of the area chairs.

They also interview a handful of home schooled students.

This year, they had requests for interviews for 268 applicants, including 34 early action applicants. T en of the early action candidates were accepted, and all of them will be attending Harvard in the fall.

Dr. Zackson has been an area chair for four years and an alumni interviewer for 23 years. She has inter viewed more than 100 students.

She lived in Grays Hall freshman year. She recalls that 1972 was the first year women were allowed to live in the Yard. She was then a resident at Leverett House.

Dr. Zackson is an Adjunct Associate Professor of Medicine at the David Gef fen School of Medicine at UCLA. She co-chairs and developed a course on social and ethical issues for medical students such as death and dying, the Affordable Care Act, and all kinds of medical decision-making especially as it relates to patient care. She also deals with curriculum development and professionalism training for interns, residents, and fellows.

Her outside interests include yoga, photography, and travel.

Dr. Zackson enjoys meeting the next generation, both as a medical educator and a Harvard Interviewer She says, "Young people challenge and inspire me, they keep me on top of my game and I find I am constantly learning from them."


What was your most memorable interview?

So many in the running-- a few notable interviews include one applicant who had served in the Israeli military and diplomatic corps before landing in Los Angeles and applying as an older student, another who came from Tibet and was far removed from the typical (if there is a typical) W est Los Angeles applicant. Many of those "typical" applicants are not typical at all, but stand out because of their passions and abilities. I've been impressed by the resolve and determination of these young people who see their future at Harvard and have worked incredibly hard to achieve that goal.
