### Faculty Lecture Series - Prof. Paul E. Peterson - June 21, 2013

This year's Faculty Lecture Series was led by Professor Paul Peterson. As the Henry Lee Shattuck Professor of Government and Director of the Program in Education Policy and Governance, Professor Peterson delivered an engaging lecture on the perilous state of education.

In his presentation, Prof. Peterson discussed the long-term benefits of better schools and and argued that digital learning can provide the customized learning needs to make necessary gains. Curriculum, he argued, will be three dimensional providing interaction via games, social networking and projects, and delivered either open and online to provide greater access and customization to learners.

Professor Peterson also stated that this type of education will be most available in institutions of higher education and not so much at the secondary school level. Therefore, he concluded that education policy needs to provide parents and students at the secondary level with the same choice as is provided in higher education. He affirmed that digital learning will disrupt the high school model as it exists today.

After the lecture, the group gathered for dinner at USC University Club. The conversation and discussion was extended with a participant sharing his learning experience growing up in Shanghai, China. Comparisons between both educational systems were made. The event concluded with several questions asked of Prof. Peterson about the next steps for education policy.



### Q&A from 02138... Catie Williams, '13



(These interviews are a regular contribution to the HCSC Newsletter and will spotlight students enrolled at Harvard who are from Southern California)

Catie Williams, '13, was born in Los Angeles, California. She graduated in 2008 from Harvard- Westlake School in North Hollywood where she sang in three different choirs, incuding as a section leader in school and a member of the Los Angeles Children's Chorus. She also received honorable mention for photography in the Spotlight Awards. Williams was a Social Studies concentrator and Quincy House resident. At Harvard, she sang with the Radcliffe Pitches for three years, and the Harvard-Radcliffe Collegium Musicum for four years. In the Collegium,

she was the financial manager, manager and President. A recent graduate, Williams was selected as one of the five senior gift co-chairs for the Class of 2013. Her father, Ken Williams '78 (Winthrop House), served as president of the Harvard Club of Southern California during 2008-2010.

**HCSC:** What was your senior thesis topic?

**CW:** I wrote a thesis this year about Upton Sinclair's campaign for Governor of California in 1934. My thesis focused on the rhetorical choices made by Upton Sinclair in his campaign for Governor of California in 1934, when he ran on the Democratic Party ticket (as opposed to the Socialist Party, of which he had been a life long member). I argued that Sinclair had made highly strategic choices about how to portray his generally radical platform (End Poverty In California, a proposal to create self-sustaining colonies on the production-for-use model) as more moderate/Democratic, using nationalist and populist rhetoric.

**HCSC:** What was your most recent prior summer internships or employment?

**CW:** Last summer I was a Summer Fellow at New Sector Alliance in Boston, working on communications strategy for a Boston Literacy non-profit.

**HCSC:** What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

**CW:** I was surprised at first with how many opportunities at Harvard were just waiting to be seized. No one at Harvard spoon feeds you directions about what to do or where to go, but if you take initiative and look for things, there is pretty much no limit to what you can accomplish.

*HCSC*: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

**CW:** The first time I visited Harvard was at my dad's 25th reunion, when I was 13-- I thought the yard was enormous and was afraid of getting lost. I remember watching my dad sing with his reunion groups and thinking that Sanders was a pretty amazing building.

**HCSC:** What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

**CW:** Professor Marglin's course on Development and Modernization has continued to impact the way I think about social issues in the world. I also loved my course with Dr. Terry Aladjem on American Law and Society, so much so that I asked him to advise my thesis the following year. Both of these courses were incredibly well taught and run, and both forced me to question deep underlying assumptions I held about the ways that communities were constructed and about the hidden consequences of seemingly harmless ideas. One example we studied was the implementation of mandatory smallpox vaccines in India. We looked at how the program, while appearing in the Western mindset to be perfectly logical and beneficial, was not at all aware of the cultural context of India and therefore ultimately created more barriers to treatment and communication.

**HCSC:** If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

**CW:** I would create more social spaces in the areas around the houses or the yard in order to foster a stronger social environment and undergraduate community, even beyond the houses. I would also allocate more money to mental health resources.

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California?

**CW:** The weather, of course!

**HCSC:** How would you describe the opportunities available to students who are interested in singing at Harvard?

**CW:** There are so many amazing places to sing at Harvard-- pretty much any kind of music, any size group, and any level of time commitment, from a casual barbershop quartet to a choir that performs enormous choral-orchestral masterworks on a regular basis. The Director of Choral Activities, Dr. Andrew Clark, is pretty new to Harvard and has been doing some really exciting things with the Collegium, Choral Society, and Glee Club. And, if there's ever something you'd like to do, but doesn't exist yet, it's pretty easy to find people to help you make it happen. For example, I worked with three of my friends this spring to have a course where we learned how to sing an early renaissance isorhythmic motet by Dufay. I had a lot of fun traveling with the Pitches. In the summer of 2010, we went to Japan and Hong Kong on an international tour. One of my favorite memories from that trip was going to the top of the peak in Hong Kong that overlooks the whole city. The international travel opportunities I had through the Collegium and through the Pitches were some of the most incredible parts of my Harvard experience.

**HCSC:** Which is your favorite all-male singing group at Harvard?

**CW:** I have to say, it's hard for any of the men's groups to hold a candle to how amazing The Radcliffe Pitches are. Relative to them, the men's group are all pretty good, I guess.

**HCSC:** Have you ever sung in a performance with your father?

**CW:** My dad and I have sung together at our church in Los Angeles fairly often, but I don't think we've ever sung together for a performance at Harvard. I wish we could have!

**HCSC:** What are your plans after graduation?

CW: I have recently moved to New York City where I am working for a marketing consulting company.

**HCSC:** What are your caeer goals?

**CW:** I am planning to take the skills I will develop at my new job and apply them to social interest or political causes in the future. I'd like to run communications and branding for national political campaigns.

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

CW: Southern California will always be home for me, though I don't know if I'll return there for quite some time.
