Southern California Schools **Committee Members Interview** a Record 2,217 Applicants

Harvard College's financial aid initiatives contributed to a record 29,112 students who applied for admission this year, a 6% increase over the prior year. Harvard's undergraduate financial aid program will be the most generous in its history, with \$147 million in scholarships.

"For those aspiring to a Harvard education and for those currently at Harvard who come from families coping with job losses, home foreclosures, shrinking home equity, and the depletion of savings and retirement funds, our renewed program arrived at a crucial time," said William R. Fitzsimmons, Dean of Admissions and Financial Aid.

"The new class is excellent in so many ways - in their accomplishments, of course, and also in their personal qualities," said Marlyn E. McGrath, Director of Admissions.

Harvard Club of Southern California to Honor Award Recipients at Annual Dinner — May 31, 2009



John Harvard Award Recipient: Father Gregory Boyle Executive Director of Homeboy Industries

Father Gregory Boyle, the Executive Director of Homeboy Industries, will be this year's recipient of the Club's John Harvard Award for Distinguished Community Service.

Father Boyle, best known as Father Greg, is a native of Los Angeles and a graduate of Loyola High School. One of eight siblings, he was ordained as a Jesuit priest in 1984. In 1992 he initiated a program called "Jobs for the Future" to address the needs of gang-involved youth. This has become a nationally recognized program called "Homeboy Industries," which is now a collection of five businesses that include a bakery, silkscreen business, café, landscaping service, and a retail store with yearly sales of \$2.5 million. For his comprehensive and effective approach to addressing gang violence and improving the lives of thousands of disadvantaged youth, Father Gregory Boyle was the recipient of a 2008 James Irvine Foundation Leadership Award.



Excellence in Education Award Recipient: Chris Steinhauser, Superintendent, Long Beach Unified School District

Chris Steinhauser, the Long Beach Unified School District Superintendent, will be the recipient of the Club's Excellence in Education Award.

As Superintendent of the third largest school district in California, Mr. Steinhauser has earned many prestigious awards for the District including the 2003-2004 Broad Prize, which honors large urban school districts for overall performance and improvement in student success while reducing the achievement gap for poor and minority students. He is a product of the Long Beach Unified School District, which he attended continuously from Kindergarten until his graduation from Wilson High. Steinhauser attended Long Beach City College and California State University, Long Beach. He began as an elementary school teacher at Burnett Elementary School, was promoted to Principal at Signal Hill Elementary School, which became known as "the miracle on Walnut Avenue." Under his leadership that spans 26 years in education, Long Beach students in all racial and ethnic groups have made unprecedented gains on rigorous state tests.

From the 2,217 applicants from Southern California, 117 students were admitted to the Class of 2013. The admitted student pool reflects growing numbers of Southern California families whose parents have graduate degrees and occupations in the professions. At the same time, Southern California's admit pool includes a diverse set of demographics. The Class of 2013 from Southern California is almost 55% ethnic minority (19.7% Latino, 8.5% African-American, 23.9% Asian-American, and 2.6% Native American).

The overall Harvard rate of admission declined from 7.9% to 7.0%, an 11% reduction. In Southern California, the admission rate declined from 5.5% to 5.3%, a 4% reduction, in part reflecting Harvard's continuing commitment to diversity. The educational challenges in Southern California underpin the differential between Harvard's overall admit rate and that for our region.

"With another record high number of applicants for our area, Schools Committee interviewers did an incredible job of carrying out interviews for nearly all of these 2,217 applicants," said Jonathan Baskin, Schools Committee Chair. "Hats off to all of our interviewers and Area Chairs for a job well done."

"The Harvard Admissions Officers really appreciate the heroic efforts of Southern California area chairs and interviewers," said Marsha Hirano-Nakanishi. "No other region has the applicant flow of Southern California, and no other region came as close to interviewing all applicants as Southern California," she added.

The Schools Committee continues to need to refresh and increase our pool of alumni interviewers. Fred served as the Club's Vice President of Finance for the past 21 years and was the Club's President in 1980-1981, in addition to holding numerous other posts. A graduate of Boston Latin School, Smith moved to Los Angeles in 1964 and immediately joined the Harvard Club upon his arrival in Southern California.

In 1997, Smith was honored by the Club as a recipient of the John Harvard Award for Distinguished Community Service, the first of two active members of the Club to ever receive the award. In 2002, he received the Outstanding Club Contribution Award from the Harvard Alumni Association. In 2006 he received the HAA Award, the Association's highest honor, for his devoted service to Harvard alumni.

At the Club's April board meeting, the Directors unanimously approved the creation of the "Fred Smith Distinguished Club Service Award", with Smith as the first award recipient. The Award will be bestowed from time to time by the Club's Board of Directors in recognition of exemplary service through long term, consistent support for Club activities while in a leadership position.
