State of the Club 2014: We Are Improving...

(These remarks were prepared by outgoing Club President Albert Chang AB ' 63, MD, who deliv-

ered the State of the Club speech at the Club's annual dinner held at the UCLA Faculty Center on June 29, 2014).

Even in his nineties, the eminent cellist Pablo Casals practiced for hours every day. When asked why he did this, he answered "I think I am improving." Last year, I reported that our Club was doing "Not Bad." This year "we are improving."

Under the leadership of our Schools Committee, over 700 alumni volunteers completed the almost impossible task of interviewing 2,719 applicants which resulted in the early admission of 52 students, and in the Spring, an additional 73 students. We welcomed these 125 successful applicants at three reception parties.

Under the leadership of our Programs Committee, we continue to sponsor about six to seven social and educational events every month. Our signature events like the annual H-Y Football game telecast, the Holiday Performance Party, and the Lunar Calendar New Year Dinner drew sold-out crowds. Two highlights were the Harvard vs. University of San Diego football game in the fall of 2013 and the Spring Harvard Re-Connect where we heard President Drew Faust's report on the Harvard

Campaign and her vision of a future Harvard. In order to stay current, our Club accommodates the interests of our members. Examples are the large attendance at the recent "Porgy and Bess" performance, the tour and performance at the Magic Castle, and the new Science Pub series.

We reviewed and modified our By-laws to make our Club a more nimble organization. These changes were described in the Club's June 2014 newsletter. Yet there are areas that our Club can do better: the recruitment of members, especially, recent graduates, participation in the Winter J term, and the Harvard-Ex on-line series. The Giant Magellan Telescope will be one member of the next class of super giant earth-based telescopes that promises to revolutionize our view and understanding of the universe. It will be constructed in the Las Campanas Observatory in Chile. Commissioning of the telescope is scheduled to begin in 2020. With a resolving power 10 times greater than that of the Hubble Space Telescope, GMT will collect more light than any other telescope in history.

Q&A from 02138... Veronica Wickline '16

(These interviews are a regular contribution to the HCSC Newsletter and will spotlight students enrolled at Harvard who are from Southern California. Nominations to profile students from our region are invited.)

Veronica Wickline '16, a resident of Kirkland House, is one of the first students to take part in the Joint Concentration Track between Classics and History known as Ancient History. She spent her middle and high school years at Polytechnic School in Pasadena, where she founded and served as co-president for SPQR, the Latin Club. She also participated significantly in Poly's debate, performing arts, and visual arts programs.

At Harvard, she is an active member of the Christian fellowship, Harvard College Faith and Action (HCFA), as well as the having played one of the two lead roles and worked as a staff writer and producer for the longtime television show, Ivory Tower. Inspired by the work being done to serve adults with intellectual disabilities in a Southern Californian church near her home, Veronica worked part-time helping a family in Cambridge care for a son with severe disabilities. Currently, she is studying abroad in Nafplion, Greece.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

VW: There really is no one answer, but perhaps one of the funnier stories comes from one of the nights before Winter Term Finals when the First Year Social Committee hosted a gingerbread house contest study break in Annenberg. I was sick; my roommate was goofing off; we were in no mood to craft a masterpiece. Consequently, our entry looked like a hurricane-swept hut. As we were placing the crowning gumdrops, the freshman dean walked by and said, "Sometimes, you're in the middle of a task, say a three-hour task, and you have to complete the task even when things aren't looking too bright...Maybe you should ask some of the other students for help with your house."

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

VW: The uneventful melting of snow. I remember sharing this observation with last season's Ivory Tower producer in early March. For months we had all been expecting the snow, and then it came, and then it melted away. Last year, there were many similarly anticipated milestones (e.g. getting into college, meeting my college roommates, deciding on a major). I am surprised that they have come and gone so quietly.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

VW: I can honestly say Harvard was the first school to attain the "dream school" title. I had already gotten in when I first visited, but I was expecting to find the rude, rich Harvard student stereotype on campus. On the contrary, I wound up in a black box theatre, a basement seder, and a fascinating lecture on Abnormal Psychology. The student body was not the crowd I had expected but rather a community humbly and eagerly striving for artistic, intellectual, and religious insight.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

VW: It's very hard to pick, but Dr. Adam Kelly's David Foster Wallace and His Generation may top the list. In this English seminar, a group of 16 students examined authors attempting to push past the irony of postmodernism. I felt like we were watching a new history of ideas unfold as we read novels such as Infinite Jest, Eat the Document, and Apex Hides the Hurt. The deep sense of community in that course made discussing the material feel more like a quest than a class.

HCSC: What do you learn during the Summer Community Fellowship (the Harvard Club of Southern California selects and funds the summer grant)?

VW: The summer after freshman year, I worked for State Senator Carol Liu in her satellite office, thanks to Harvard's Center for Public Interest Careers Summer Community Fellowship Grant. Optimizing my office time and finding accurate information quickly were the two most valuable skills I took from my internship. There are always seven or eight things to do at once, and you have to be actively engaged every moment you're working. Having the chance to research Southern Californian issues and organizations in preparing representatives for events improved my ability to gather information quickly while also providing vital information on the issues facing my own home community.

HCSC: How did the senator you interned for serve as a role model?

VW: The Senator is both caring and effective. There's a stereotype of the ideal businessman who bulldozes past social issues to accomplish his goals, and there's another image of the sweet but useless activist or stakeholder. Senator Carol Liu is neither. The way she conducts affairs of state has proven to me that you don't have to leave your soul at the door if you want to accomplish great things.

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

VW: I would reform the treatment of General Education at Harvard. In the current General Education program, most departments offer either very easy courses or courses designed to winnow down a vast pool of prospective concentrators. The former courses offer little to no lasting educational benefit, while the latter require students to devote the vast majority of their study time to one course. This leaves many students in a double bind: Do I throw away a quarter of my schedule to a course that promises little in return, or do I devote 80% of my time or more to an interesting course with a fiercely competitive group of students in which I am almost guaranteed to receive a less than satisfactory grade?

Were I the president of Harvard, I would encourage departments to find a happy medium. On the one hand, make senior seminars and junior tutorials available for GE credit to students with the aptitude to take them. On the other, create a set of courses for non-concentrators separate from those designed to winnow out those who won't devote the vast majority of their time to the subject.

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather)?

VW: My family. My friends, although many of them have moved away from our hometown, as I have. It still makes me sad that—barring weddings and funerals—all of the people I love may never all be in the same room at once.

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after graduation?

VW: Ideally, I would settle down in the LA area. I'm considering the Peace Corp after graduation, and I'll probably move wherever I can find a job for the first few years after college. I look forward to joining the community of Harvard alumni in Southern California as a friend and colleague in the years ahead.


