



Q & A from 02138:

Steve Cox '23



Steve Cox '23, a concentrator in Applied Math, was born in Los Angeles, CA and graduated from Loyola High School in 2018. He is a senior residing in Dunster House. At Harvard, Steve is a rower on the Men's Varsity Heavyweight Rowing team. Off the water, he is the former Chairman and President of the Harvard Investment Association, a 3-year representative on the Harvard Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, and a Portfolio Manager for Black Diamond Capital Investors. This past summer, he worked as a Private Equity Summer Analyst at Ares Management Corporation in Los Angeles.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

SC: When I arrived at Harvard freshman year, I was surprised by how warm and welcoming the community was. Between the upperclassmen on my team, the group of classmates on my FOP trip, and new friends in my Wigglesworth entryway, I felt right at home around campus. The friendships the formed in the fall of 2018 still remain strong today.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

SC: I first visited Harvard during my high school winter in 2017. I recall feeling excited to see how happy everyone looked around the Yard; all the people I met were involved in so many great groups and activities. During that trip, I took a campus tour which really helped me gain insight into what life looked like around the Square. The most exciting part, however, was getting the chance to meet my current coaches on the rowing team and walk through Newell Boathouse.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

SC: My favorite class was Contemporary Developing Countries, co-taught by Professor Tarun Khanna from Harvard Business School and Dr. Satchit Balsari from Harvard Medical School. The course was centered around finding entrepreneurial solutions to social and economic challenges and included guest lecturs by professors in the Engineering and Design schools. Additionally, the class was divided into group work, and since the course was taught for both undergraduate and students across the Business, Law, and Kennedy Schools, this was my first opportunity to work closely with graduate students. This class was an excellent way to see how technical material from my classes could make a real world of difference.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

SC: My freshman year, I remember rowing on the water in some of the worst conditions I have ever seen. The rain was coming down very heavily and waves were hitting the boats from all sides, but the rowers in my boat were holding strong and enjoying the inclement

weather. Our coxswain was leading us through a racing workout side-by-side with another boat when all of a sudden everyone in our crew (and for sure the neighboring crew too) heard yelping and shouting from the stern of the boat. It turned out that in one of the waves, a live fish came overboard and was flopping around in our coxswain's lap. When we got back to the dock, we very proudly saw our coxswain display his "Catch of the Day" — which ultimately turned out to be the world's smallest fish. He was very proud of his new fishing abilities and our whole team got a good laugh that morning.

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

SC: If I were President of Harvard, I would increase student interaction with professors outside of the classroom. My roommates and I invited one of our computer science professors to a dinner in Dunster House and that was an excellent experience. Additionally, one of my freshman seminar instructors took our whole class to lunch on the final day to talk about where he thought the future of math was headed, a very cool topic for an aspiring math major. I think hearing about my professor's research and life outside of the classroom really helped me to make a connection and relate with his experience. More opportunities and events designed for this type of interaction would be a great add to campus life.

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather, food and family)?

SC: One surprising thing I miss about Southern California is the driving. Throughout high school and over the summers, driving was a time for me to listen to music or hang out with my family and friends. The periods of time I spent in the car really were uninterrupted times to relax and decompress. I definitely miss those long peaceful moments around Los Angeles.

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

SC: After college, I am returning to Los Angeles as a private equity analyst at Ares. I am looking forward to returning to see friends from high school as well as new friends I have made in Boston who have moved out to the West Coast. I also look forward to hosting visitors and showing them why I love SoCal. I am a true Californian at heart and I am excited that I will be back near my family in the near future.

HCSC: How did you manage the transition to virtual classes?

SC: I thought the transition was brutal even though Harvard did everything it could to make things work. I learned that to succeed in a virtual environment, I needed to go to more online office hours and get to know the teaching staff more to help replace the conversations after a normal lecture that supplement the material. On a logistical level, my two sisters were also taking online courses at school, my parents were working from home, and our wifi frequently cut out or could not support the entire family at once. I am grateful that my final two years were on campus, in person, and back to a relatively normal instructional format. I actually took a gap year due to Covid during 2020-2021 and moved to London with some of my teammates. I lived in a boathouse there and worked for a local company. It was a brutal year but it was definitely better than it might have been because I was with my team.
