President's Letter – May 2025

Well, April was quite a month for Harvard. I'm writing this message after reading Harvard's lawsuit against the federal government arising out of the illegal freezing of billions of dollars in federal funding to our alma mater. By the time this newsletter goes to press, you will have undoubtedly been bombarded by news coverage and op-eds about this important lawsuit. But if you have not read Harvard's original legal complaint, which was emailed to all alumni on April 21, I implore you to read it now. I know it's 50 pages—but they're double-spaced with wide margins, so it's not as time-consuming as you might think! And nothing else will give you a better understanding of what's at stake as Harvard defends its institutional and academic freedom in the face of unprecedented government overreach.

As most of you know, the federal government has claimed that freezing Harvard's funding is necessary to curb antisemitism on campus. I share many people's concerns about the rise of antisemitism among students and faculty at many universities, including Harvard, and I have been shocked and dismayed as Jewish and Israeli students have been targeted and harassed. But make no mistake—the federal government's latest gambit has nothing to do with stopping antisemitism. Curbing hate will not be accomplished by terminating the funding of ground-breaking research at hospitals, laboratories, and think tanks in the areas of medicine, public health, technology, and national security... research that continually leads to advancements that improve the well-being of our country and our planet. So no, the federal government's actions are not about curbing antisemitism but rather about taking down higher education. And what better place to start than Harvard.

So what do we do now? First, read Harvard's lawsuit (really, it's not that long). Second, think about donating to Harvard. Even a modest donation at this time shows that you support academic freedom. Third, stay informed so that you can defend Harvard against those who would like to see Harvard "taken down." To that end, the Harvard Club of Southern California is working with the Harvard Alumni Association to provide forums in which you can hear directly from the University and alumni leaders about the latest developments in the current litigation and ways to support Harvard through these unprecedented times. By the time you read this message, the first of these events should already be posted on our Club's website.

But if you do nothing else, please read Harvard's lawsuit. You'll be glad you did. You will never feel prouder of our alma mater or fear more for its future.



Avery Hansberger '25, a double concentrator in Economics and Theater, Dance & Media, was born in Redlands and graduated as valedictorian from John W. North High School (Riverside, CA). In high school, he founded the Environmental Science Club/Team, was on Varsity Swim, starred in nine Theater Productions and a local TV show, and was a National History Day, National Silver Medal. Now a senior in Mather House, Avery is a member of the Hasty Pudding Theatricals Business Staff and a former-President of the Asian Student Arts Project. Last summer, Avery was a recipient of an Artistic Development Fellowship (awarded by the Harvard Office For the Arts) and spent his time doing thesis research at the Stella Adler: Art of Acting Studio in LA. His thesis, a play written and performed by himself, explores 20th Century Realism Acting techniques and paints a picture of what it is like to train as an actor today.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

AH: I was most surprised by how easy it is to cater your academics at Harvard to your wants and needs. As a double concentrator, I was able to study in two very different fields while making my journey in each unique to me. This flexibility was a reason I decided to attend Harvard, and it far exceeded my expectations.
