Harvard Admissions Update

Harvard College recently finalized its decisions for the Class of 2021 and sent out acceptances on March 30. Including Early Action, 2,056 students were offered a spot in the Class of 2021. With nearly 40,000 applicants, that equates to a 5.2% acceptance rate, slightly below last year's 5.22%. Of the students accepted into the Class of 2021, 938 were accepted during Early Action (46%) and 1,118 were offered acceptance in the Regular period (54%).

William R. Fitzsimmons, Dean of Admissions and Financial Aid, said, "The Admissions Committee has assembled a class that promises to be one of the best in Harvard's long history. It will be exciting to witness their progress during their Harvard years and beyond." Fitzsimmons also commented on the diversity in the current class, "We have worked very, very hard over many, many years to increase the economic diversity of the student body." Sarah C. Donahue, Griffin Director of Financial Aid, added, "For 90 percent of American families, it costs less to attend Harvard than one of the nation's public universities. Bringing promising students to Harvard is our main objective, and we believe that financial circumstances should never cloud a student's decision to apply. That is why we remain committed to supporting every admitted student with need-based aid."

The Class of 2021 will arrive from cities, suburbs, and small towns throughout the United States, in addition to bringing a strong international presence. Southern California had a total of 101 acceptances out of 2,942 applicants (3.4%). Of these 101 acceptances, 46 were accepted Early Action, and 55 were accepted in the Regular period. Receptions were held in Los Angeles and Newport Beach on April 8th to congratulate these students and their families, and to thank the hundreds of alumni who interviewed candidates. Many of these accepted students were planning on visiting Cambridge for Visitas the weekend of April 21st, and decisions by these students were due on May 1st. 


Science Pub Series Hits Milestone

Q&A from 02138:

Tyler Spitzer '19



Tyler Spitzer '19, a concentrator in economics, was born in Pasadena and graduated from San Marino High School, where he played football and baseball for the Titans. He held a number of leadership positions in Boy Scout Troop 355, including Assistant Senior Patrol Leader, and is an Eagle Scout. He also served as team captain of the varsity football team his senior year.

He is currently a sophomore residing in Mather House. At Harvard, he is a cornerback on the Crimson football team. Last summer, he trained locally for the 2016 fall season while also serving as a travel chaperon for Catalina Island Camps. He spent his summer prior to attending Harvard as a Real Estate Market Research Assistant at KW Commercial in Studio City.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

TS: I was surprised by how helpful students are to one another. Harvard fosters a collaborative environment; outside of the limitless resources and tutoring options that Harvard has to offer, some of the most constructive input I've received has been from fellow students.
