Harvard Navigates Attacks By Federal Government, Clouding Its Future

As most of you already know, the Trump administration is waging an aggressive campaign against Harvard by threatening Harvard's tax-exempt status; freezing \$3.2 billion in federal grants and contracts; and working to revoke the visas of international students, who constitute 27% of Harvard's students.

The pretext for these unprecedented attacks is Harvard's alleged failure to curb antisemitism on campus, and the University's refusal to comply with the overreaching demands of the federal government relating to Harvard's admissions, hiring, and international student enrollment. In a letter revoking Harvard's ability to enroll foreign students, U.S. Secretary of Homeland Security Kristi Noem claimed the school is "perpetuating an unsafe campus environment that is hostile to Jewish students, promotes pro-Hamas sympathies, and employs racist diversity, equity, and inclusion policies."

In a May 27 interview with NPR, Harvard President Alan Garber said that the federal government's decision to freeze billions in federal grants due in part to antisemitism on campus was "perplexing" because the measures taken by the federal government to address these concerns "do not even hit the same people that they believe are causing the problems." He added that cutting off research funding hurts Harvard, but it hurts the nation as well, since research funding is given to universities to conduct work that the federal government designates as high priority. He added, "It is hard to see the link between that and, say, antisemitism."

Harvard has initiated multiple lawsuits against the federal government related to the cuts in federal funding and the attempted infringement of academic freedom. Garber said in the NPR interview that he views the actions against Harvard as a warning to other higher education institutions. "We need to be firm in our commitments to what we stand for: education, pursuit of the truth, and helping to educate our students for a better future. In the end, we are about producing and disseminating knowledge and serving our nation and our world."

Gary Barkin '86, JD '93, president of the Harvard Club of Southern California, urges members to stay informed about the current litigation. "There is a lot of disinformation about the government's battle with Harvard," he said. "As Harvard alums, you will likely have friends and colleagues ask you about the conflict. Staying well-informed is the best way to explain Harvard's position and win over those who don't understand what's currently at stake for all higher education."







Courtney B. Vance '82 and Nicholas Melvoin '08 Win Seats in 2025 Harvard Alumni Elections

The Harvard Club of Southern California is pleased to announce that Courtney B. Vance '82 of La Canada Flintridge was elected to the Harvard Board of Overseers in the 2025 spring elections. Mr. Vance will serve a six-year term. The Board of Overseers is one of two governing boards of Harvard University and plays an integral role in the University's governance.

Mr. Vance is a distinguished actor, producer, and writer. He is the president and chair of the SAG-AFTRA Foundation. He has received Emmys for his roles in Lovecraft Country and The People v. O.J. Simpson. He has also won a Tony Award and a Critics Choice award, and he has been nominated for a Grammy, Golden Globe, and Screen Actors Guild Award. He served as the 2024 Harvard Alumni Day keynote speaker.

Nicholas J. Melvoin '08 of Los Angeles will serve as a Harvard Alumni Association Elected Director for a three-year term. Mr. Melvoin is a civic leader, teacher, and attorney with a deep commitment to public service and education. He is in his eighth year as an elected board member of the Los Angeles Unified School District. He served as a past vice president of the LAUSD Board of Education, which is the second-largest school district in the U.S. He is a member of the Harvard Kennedy School Board of Advisors, and he has lectured at both the Kennedy School and the Graduate School of Education.
