Class of 2027 Admissions

Admissions to the Class of 2027 were sent out on March 31, 2023. Including Early Action, Harvard received 56,937 applications, down about 7% from last year, and accepted 3.4% of the students applying, the second lowest rate ever, up from the record low of 3.19% last year.

Southern California had approximately 3,242 applicants this year, a decrease of 7.7% from 3,512 last year. Thirty were accepted in the Early Action process (out of 316), eight Early Action applicants were deferred to Regular Action and accepted, and 43 were accepted in the Regular Action process (out of 2926), for a total of 84 acceptances and an overall acceptance rate of 2.5%.

"Each year Harvard seeks extraordinarily talented students from across the nation and around the world," said William R. Fitzsimmons, dean of admissions and financial aid. "The students admitted to the Class of 2027 are remarkable by any measure, and we hope they choose to bring their diverse ideas, beliefs, and experiences to our campus."

The Class of 2027 reflects the increasing diversity of the College's applicants, with 15.3 percent identifying as African American/Black, 29.9 percent as Asian American, 11.3 percent as Latinx, 2.2 percent as Native American, and 0.5 percent as Native Hawaiian. Women account for 53.6 percent of all those accepted.

Traditionally, the Harvard Club of Southern California hosts events for newly admitted students. This year, Harry Kim '86, the Club's Co-VP Schools and Scholarships, organized an in person reception for students and their parents at the home of Gary Barkin '86 JD '93 and Haya Handel on April 16. The event was attended by approximately 40 admitted students. Final decisions on accepting Harvard's offer of admission are due May 1. The application process for the Class of 2028 will begin in the late summer. 
Harvard, Hollywood, Hitmen, and Holy Men: Discussion with Paul Williams '65

Q & A from 02138: Noah Brune '24



Noah Brune, matriculated with the class of 2023, took a gap year during the online COVID year and is now in the class of 2024. He is an Applied Mathematics and Economics concentrator and pursuing a language citation in Japanese. He was born in Bellevue, Washington and graduated from Santa Margarita Catholic High School where he swam on the Varsity team for four years. He resides in Eliot House and competes on the Men's Swimming and Diving team where he earned Second Team CSCAA Individual Scholar All-America honors and helped the Crimson capture the Ivy League championship for the fifth straight year. This last summer he worked for Wells Fargo and plans to do investment banking in Charlotte this upcoming summer.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

NB: I was surprised about how close the Harvard community was and how all students are willing to help one another out. I definitely was expecting a more competitive environment, but that was definitely not the case. Everyone that I have met has come from diverse backgrounds and are all eager to become better students as a whole.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions?

NB: I visited Harvard on an unofficial visit during my Junior year of high school. I immediately fell in love with the coaching staff and the swim team as they were extremely welcoming and seemed as if they wanted me to join the program. Apart from the swim team, I loved Cambridge and the campus, which only further made my college decision easier.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

NB: My favorite class here is any of my Japanese classes. I am half Japanese and whenever I visited my family in Japan, I always felt as if I was missing out because I was unable to speak the language. HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

HCSC: If you were the President of Harvard, what would you change?

NB: I would not honestly change that much about Harvard if I was the President. I love the diverse environment and everything that the school stands for. If I was being extremely nit-picky, I would have hot breakfast at every house's dining hall, but at the very least, in every neighborhood.

NB: I definitely want to live in SoCal again after I graduate. That has been my home since I was three years old, so almost all of my pre-college memories have come from there. It would definitely be a blessing if I could end up back in SoCal and raise a family there.

HCSC: How did you manage the transition to virtual classes?

NB: I did not take any Harvard virtual classes, but during my leave of absence, I did take some virtual classes through my local community college. It was definitely different, but I tried to keep a positive outlook and open mind while studying.
