Plant yourself among fellow alums, water yourself with drinks, cultivate old friendships, and sow the seeds of new ones; all amidst the spectacular flora and fauna of a Southern California treasure. This year we will be celebrating the accomplishments of three incredible members of our local community.



The 2019 John Harvard Award for Distinguished Community Service will be presented to Supervisor Sheila Kuehl JD '78, who represents Los Angeles County's Third District and currently chairs the Board of Supervisors. As the first woman

in California history to be named Speaker Pro Tempore of the Assembly and the first openly gay or lesbian person to be elected to the California Legislature, Ms. Kuehl has been a model of courage and leadership throughout her political career. As Supervisor she has undertaken or collaborated on a number of initiatives to improve the quality of life and reform systems in the County, including increasing the minimum wage, providing unprecedented funding and services for our homeless population, innovating on issues of water conservation and recycling, protecting the

Santa Monica Mountains and the coast, reforming adult and juvenile justice systems to emphasize "second chance" and anti-recidivism programs, and establishing true universal health insurance in California, to name only a few.



The 2019 Excellence in Education Award will be presented to Dr. Francis Su PhD '95. Currently the Benediktsson-Karwa Professor of Mathematics at Harvey Mudd College, Dr. Su has received multiple awards from the Mathematical Association of America, including the Henry L. Alder Award and the Haimo Award, both for distinguished teaching. From 2015-2016 Dr. Su was the president of the Mathematical Association of America, the first Asian American to hold that post. During both of those years the U.S. won first place at the International Mathematics Olympiad for pre-college

students, held in Hong Kong. Currently Dr. Su is designing an app to help teach and promote mathematics.



The 2019 Fred Smith Award for Distinguished Service to the Harvard Club of Southern California will be presented to Elizabeth "Betsey" Gillis Warden '82. Serving as a board member since 1997, Betsey is one of the Club's longest serving directors. Betsey has held many leadership positions over the years, including Vice President for Programs, Vice President for Orange County, Executive Vice President, and President. During her presidency from 2002-2004, Betsey championed expanding membership and working closely with community leaders. Betsey is an attorney specializing in busi-

ness contracts and trust and estates. She lives in Newport Beach with her husband Bill Warden, and their children Parker, Sumner, and Walker Warden, who may be frequently found helping behind the scenes at Harvard Club events. Betsey will serve as the Club's Vice President of Radcliffe in the coming term.

Q&A from 02138:

Andrew Pérez '20



Andrew Pérez '20, a concentrator in Sociology, was born and raised in Pico Rivera and graduated from Loyola High School. At Loyola, he founded the First-Generation Student Association, and Kino Cubs (an immigrant rights group on campus). He was co-captain of the debate team in which three members of the Lincoln-Douglas division went on to compete at the Tournament of Champions. He helped Loyola create a bridge program for incoming students from first-generation and low-income backgrounds. He is a rising senior residing in Mather House (without a doubt, the best house). At Harvard, he spent the first two years working on first-generation, low-income advocacy efforts. As former president of the First-Generation Student Union, he helped establish a new pre-orientation program at Harvard for first-generation, low-income students called the First-Year Retreat & Experience (FYRE). Last summer, he spent his time on campus working on the pre-orientation program and at the Bok Center as a Learning Lab Undergraduate Fellow. In preparation for his thesis, Andrew will be conducting research this summer on ICE agents and their relationship with local jurisdictions and communities in Southern California, Arizona, and Texas.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

AP: I was pleasantly surprised about how little homesick I have felt these last three years. While I do miss my family deeply, I find myself busy and focused on the million and one events that are going on every single day at Harvard.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

AP: I visited Harvard during my junior year of high school during our East Coast College Tour. I remember it being 10 degrees that day, but I did not hesitate to think for a second that Harvard was the school from me. While walking around Lowell House, I remember seeing a student read a book that I was familiar with. We chatted about it, and that is when I realized the special community that exists at Harvard.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

AP: My favorite professor at Harvard has been Professor Manja Klemencic. She has had a tremendous influence on my academic trajectory. From writing my letter of recommendation for the Mellon Mays Undergraduate Fellowship to giving me the opportunity to TF her course, she has been one of my strongest supporters at Harvard.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

AP: One of the funniest moments has to be during my sophomore year when a group of us went to Montreal for Spring Break. We left campus at midnight and drove overnight to avoid a Cambridge Nor'easter. We also managed to keep the rental car safe after lots of parallel parking in the Montreal snow. When we finally got back to Cambridge, and thought we were in the clear, our car got towed from a Walgreens parking lot. The impound lot was literally right across the street, so we didn't have to walk far to retrieve it; but it certainly made our #Spring-Broke trip a little more broke.

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would you change?

AP: I would centralize Harvard more, especially offices at the college. I would also hold monthly town halls where I could hear directly from students what it is they want during their time here. HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather and family)?

AP: I miss the vibe of Southern California. Everyone on the East Coast seems like they always have another place to be, while back home I feel as if people appreciate the moment a little more.

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

AP: Southern California is home. Regardless of how far I venture out, I find myself always coming back home.

HCSC: Any questions you want to pose to yourself to answer?

AP: There are so many students that go home during breaks that would absolutely love to be involved with the Harvard Club of Southern Club. Please let us know how we can get involved!

In addition to his children, family, friends, and the Kansas City Chiefs, Don was passionate about running, biking, swimming, and just about any other athletic activity, and he competed in numerous triathlons, marathons, 5Ks, and other activities that combined his love of athletics and being around people. Even in his passing, Don demonstrated his concern and care of others by donating his organs, saving the lives of three people in need.
