### Community Service and Education Leaders Lauded at Harvard Club Annual Dinner

The Harvard Club of Southern California's Annual Dinner on Sunday, June 29 attracted a large audience, with a sell-out crowd filling the glass dome-covered Garden Court at the Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens.

The Club bestowed the 2025 John Harvard Award for Distinguished Community Service on California State Senator Ben Allen '00. Senator Allen spoke about growing up in Southern California, attending Harvard, Cambridge, and Berkeley Law, and his 11 years in the California State Senate, where he represents the Westside, Hollywood, and South Bay communities of Los Angeles County. Mr. Allen discussed his commitment to education and the environment and shared reflections on his career in politics.

Immediate Past President Joan Chu Reese '85, who introduced the Senator, said "Given the vast amount of good for Californians that Senator Allen does on a daily basis by making quality education, our beautiful environment, economic opportunity, and the arts more accessible to

all, this award was so well deserved."

Former Los Angeles Unified School District Superintendent and Vision to Learn founder Austin Beutner presented the Harvard Club's 2025 Excellence in Education Award to Mike Romero, a senior executive in the Los Angeles Unified School District, and described Mr. Romero's significant contributions to LAUSD. Mr. Romero served in LAUSD for 36 years as an educator, local school district superintendent, and chief of transition programs including early education, adult and career education, education options, and the Virtual Academy.

HCSC Club President Gary Barkin '86, JD '93 discussed the robust state of the Club and the current challenges facing Harvard University by the federal government. "The current administration's attacks on our alma mater are unprecedented. By opposing the federal government's efforts to curtail Harvard's academic independence, Harvard is standing up for higher education across the nation," Mr. Barkin said.

Mr. Barkin suggested that club members stay informed about Harvard's lawsuit against the federal government and continue to advocate for the university's academic freedom. Mr. Barkin also welcomed several new members to the Club's board and thanked outgoing members for their service to the alumni community.

## After the L.A. Fires: Understanding and Coping with Grief and **Emotional Recovery**

On June 11, the club hosted a webinar which brought together a community of experts and listeners to reflect and begin healing for those grieving the loss of homes and stability following the devastating LA wildfires. Organized in collaboration with Kimia Grigoriev ALB '23, ALM '25, and moderated by Madeleine Mejia Ed.M.'00, the session offered over 180 attendees strategies, resources, and a space at a time when many are seeking comfort and clarity in the aftermath of disaster.

Dr. David Mischoulon, Professor of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, opened the conversation by guiding listeners through the difference between grief and clinical depression. He reminded the audience that feelings of sadness, exhaustion, and withdrawal are natural parts of mourning. He encouraged attendees to reach out early and often, whether for themselves or for loved ones.

Rev. Mel Kawakami M.Div '74, Th.M. '87, offered deeply grounding words on spiritual resilience. He spoke of the power of community rituals, shared storytelling, and being present for one another as ways to begin rebuilding a sense of hope and connection.

Kimia Grigoriev ALB '23, ALM '25, spoke about how children, especially those who think and learn differently, experience grief. She shared developmentally supportive strategies including the use of visual aids, predictable routines, and creative outlets for expression.

Dr. Cynthia Meyersburg PhD '10, a clinical psychologist and Harvard lecturer, provided insight into the wide range of emotional responses that can follow trauma such as shock, anger, guilt, and numbness. She encouraged self-care practices including journaling, honest conversations, and the slow re-establishment of everyday routines to help individuals restore balance and well-being over time.

To continue this journey of healing and connection, a virtual book talk and discussion group centered on Resilient Grieving by Lucy Hone is currently scheduled for August 19. This gathering will offer another meaningful opportunity for those affected by the fires to come together, share, and explore paths forward in community.


