Join us for the Harvard Club of Southern California's Annual Meeting and Awards Dinner at the beautiful Huntington Library, Art Collection, and Botanical Gardens. Plant yourself among fellow alums, water yourself with drinks, cultivate old friendships, and sow the seeds of new ones; all amidst the spectacular flora and fauna of a Southern California treasure. This year we will be celebrating the accomplishments of two incredible members of our local community.



The 2018 John Harvard Award for Distinguished Public Service will be presented to the Honorable Carlos Moreno. During his ten-year tenure on the California Supreme Court, from 2001 to 2011, he authored over 140 majority opinions on a wide range of precedent-setting cases, including significant issues involving LGBT

rights, arbitration, and insurance policy coverage. Most notably, he is remembered as the lone and controversial dissent in *Strauss* v. *Horton*, the lawsuit challenging Proposition 8. From 2014 to 2017, Justice Moreno served as United States Ambassador to Belize, where he made strides to advance citizen security within Belize and in the region, focusing on citizen protection, economic development,

and governance. Justice Moreno also oversaw a blue-ribbon review of a well-publicized faculty racial discrimination case at UCLA which resulted in added protections and processes for students, staff, and faculty.



The 2018 Excellence in Education Award will be presented to Fidel A. Vargas '90, MBA '99. Mr. Vargas is President and CEO of the Hispanic Scholarship Fund, the nation's leading provider of scholarships and services designed to give Latino students full access to the opportunities a college education can provide. With more than \$500 million in scholarships awarded since its founding in 1975, HSF continues to provide increasing numbers of students all the tools they need to apply to college, do well in their course work, graduate, enter a profession, excel, help lead our nation going forward, and mentor the generations to come. At the age of twenty-three, Mr. Vargas became the country's youngest elected mayor of a major city: Baldwin Park, California. He has been recognized

for his accomplishments by numerous organizations and media outlets throughout his career, and *Time* named him one of the Top 50 Young Leaders in the United States. Mr. Vargas graduated with honors from Harvard with an A.B. in Social Studies. He received his M.B.A. from Harvard Business School, with a concentration in Entrepreneurship and General Management.

Science Pub #13 – Assessing Climate Change

On April 22, forty HCSC members and their guests met at Dupar's Restaurant for a riveting lecture and discussion by Dr. Donald Rapp on climate change. This was the thirteenth "Science Pub" organized by board members Ethel Laczko and German Enciso. Dr. Rapp is retired from the Jet Propulsion Lab. His 2012 book *The Climate Debate* is considered a landmark publication. An engineer by training, Dr. Rapp emphasized a large number of variables that need to be measured or calculated and their complex interactions. Dr. Rapp concluded that the extent of future warming is difficult to predict, and its impacts are even more uncertain. Nevertheless, the world should strive to reduce future carbon dioxide emissions. Radcliffe on the Road


On May 16, over a hundred HCSC members and guests were treated to a presentation at the SLS Hotel by Jane Kamensky, Pforzheimer Foundation Director of Harvard's Schlesinger Library. Cynthia Torres, past president of both the Harvard Alumni Association and the HCSC, introduced Professor Kamensky and screened a short video on the work of the library. Professor Kamensky spoke about the founding of the library in 1943 and detailed its vital efforts to collect, archive, and document the history of women in America. The vast collection has become an ever-expanding repository of documents and artifacts relating to women's rights and civil rights, the sexual revolution, the changing American family, and the actions and activism of American women since World War II. It has also compiled what is easily the largest collection in the U.S. of materials dating back to colonial times on women's issues, the suffrage movement, feminism, and related topics of gender and sexuality. 



Eduardo Andrés González '18



Eduardo Andrés González '18 is a Social Studies concentrator who focused his studies on contemporary Latin American immigration. His senior thesis, titled Immoral Constructions: Central American Refugee Flows from the 1980s-2010s, investigated how the American asylum system has responded to Central American refugee crises throughout the decades. Eduardo was born in San Dimas, California, and graduated in 2014 from Bonita High School, where he was his class's valedictorian and student body president. In fact, Eduardo was the student body president for both his junior and senior years of high school, making him the only two-year student body president of Bonita since 1943, according to high school administrators. He was also one of the captains of the varsity soccer team during his senior year. At Harvard, Eduardo is a senior residing in Mather House. He has been elected to serve as a representative on the College's student government body, the Undergraduate Council, for four consecutive years—making him the only four-year representative on the Council in the class of 2018. Eduardo spent his last summer as a legal intern with Sanctuary for Families, a non-profit legal services provider in New York City that represents survivors of domestic violence. During his prior summer, Eduardo worked as an investigative intern for the Public Defender Service of Washington, D.C.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

EAG: I've been surprised by how easy it has been to find a home here. Before arriving at Harvard, I worried about whether it would be a harsh, sink-or-swim environment. And perhaps I was one of the lucky ones who swam, but throughout my four years here, I have been surrounded by friends and strongly supported by my communities.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

EAG: I first visited Harvard in the spring of 2013. I was with my dad on a college visit road trip during the spring break of my junior year. The overwhelming feeling that I remember was that of disorientation; I couldn't place myself as I walked into Harvard Yard. I didn't know which way was north; I didn't know what activities took place in which buildings; I didn't know where I was. I'm happy to say that I do now.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

EAG: The answers for these two are separate. My favorite class was absolutely *Dirty Wars, Peace Processes, and the Politics of History in Latin America,* taught by Dr. Kirsten Weld. The class was incredibly fascinating—I loved learning about the darker histories of various Latin American regimes and connecting their stories to present day politics. But my favorite professor has been Dr. Roland Fryer. Fryer, an economist, is capable of making anyone excited about economics. Furthermore, he is evidently a genius, but he really knows how to keep it real—how to stay grounded and hungry for more.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

EAG: My friends and I once sat in the Lowell House dining hall crying of laughter during reading week after watching an irreverent cartoon video about people who want to work at Goldman Sachs. It was a hilarious indictment of fellow students who are so driven to work incredibly long and tiring hours at prestigious investment banks, and the combination of exam-related

sleep deprivation, coffee, and the ridiculousness of it all sent my friends and me into hysterics.

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

EAG: The University would create/designate a physical space for inclusion and belonging (think cultural centers), while simultaneously elevating the Committee on Ethnicity, Migration and Rights to department status, making it an academic home for various ethnicity-related academic fields (like Latino studies).

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather and family)?

EAG: I miss Southern California's seemingly effortless diversity. Sometimes, even Cambridge and Boston are underwhelming in this area. Additionally, I miss my beautiful mountains. You don't spend 18 formative years with those proud peaks as a stalwart, everyday backdrop without getting pretty attached.

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

EAG: After Harvard, I will be working for two years at Mintz Levin, a Boston law firm. After that, I will (hopefully!) be able to return to my sweet California for law school, and finally, I hope to settle down and practice law in Southern California. How could I not? It is, objectively, the most beautiful place on earth.
