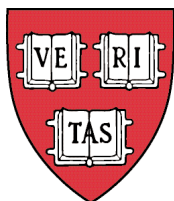

Sunday, May 31, 2015: **2015 Harvard Club Annual Dinner**

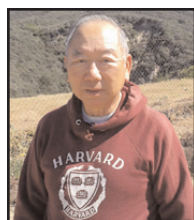
You are invited to attend the annual membership meeting and awards dinner. We look forward to celebrating the accomplishments of three incredible members of our local community, Lucy Jones, PhD, Erwin Chemerinsky JD '78 and Dr. Albert Chang, AB '63.



The 2015 **John Harvard Award for Distinguished Service to the Community** will be presented to **Lucy Jones, Ph.D.** Dr. Jones has been a seismologist with the US Geological Survey and a Visiting Research Associate at the Seismological Laboratory of Caltech since 1983. She currently serves as Science Advisor for Risk Reduction in the Natural Hazards Mission of the US Geological Survey, leading long-term science planning for natural hazards research. She also leads the SAFRR Project (Science Application for Risk Reduction) to apply USGS science to reduce risk in communities across the Nation. In 2014, she partnered with the City of Los Angeles, serving as the Mayor's Science Advisor for Seismic Safety and has led the development of a critically important, comprehensive plan for securing the water system, safeguarding communication infrastructure and retrofitting buildings in the city to make them earthquake safe.



The 2014 Educator of the Year Award will be presented to Dean Erwin Chemerinsky, HLS '78. Dean Chemerinsky is the founding Dean and Distinguished Professor of Law, and Raymond Pryke Professor of First Amendment Law, at the UC Irvine School of Law. He also taught for 21 years at the USC School of Law. His areas of expertise are constitutional law, federal practice, civil rights and civil liberties, and appellate litigation. He is the author of eight books, including "The Case Against the Supreme Court" published in 2014, and more than 200 articles in top law reviews. He frequently argues cases before the nation's highest courts, including the United States Supreme Court.



The Fred Smith Award for Outstanding Service to the Harvard Club of Southern California will be presented to Dr. Albert Chang, AB '63, immediate past President of the club and past VP for Programs.

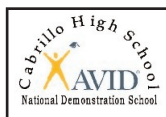

Q&A from 02138... Ben Zauzmer '15

Ben Zauzmer '15, a concentrator in Applied Math/Government with a secondary in Computer Science, was born in Abington, Pennsylvania, and graduated from Upper Dublin High School in Fort Washington, Pennsylvania, where he led the mock trial team, the model UN club, the math team, and the debate team, and served as class president. He was also the captain of a three-time national champion American Regions Mathematics League team. He is a senior residing in Mather House. His older sister is Julie Zauzmer '13, who was editor of *The Crimson* and is currently a reporter at *The Washington Post*. His younger sister is Emily Zauzmer '18.

At Harvard, he is in charge of the sports department of WHRB, the student radio station, and does play-by-play for football and basketball games. He has called five Crimson March Madness games in Salt Lake City, Spokane and Jacksonville as well as three Harvard-Yale games. Ben, known as the voice of Crimson sports, was profiled in *The Harvard Crimson* on March 19, 2015, the day he called his final game for WHRB 95.3 FM when the Crimson faced the University of North Carolina in the NCAA basketball tournament.

Ben is also involved in the Small Claims Advisory Service, including a year spent as co-executive director. SCAS is a volunteer group that offers free legal advice to anyone with questions about the Massachusetts small claims court. Outside of class, he spends his time playing guitar for the reform minyan at Hillel, spending time with his wonderful roommates, friends, and younger sister (Emily, currently a freshman), and trying to convince fellow Philadelphians on campus to forgo three hours of homework time per week in order to watch Eagles games with him.

Ben devised a statistical model to predict the Oscars, resulting in over 80% of categories over the past four years, and he has written articles about his Oscar analysis for the *The Hollywood Reporter*, *The Boston Globe*, and *The Huffington Post*. For this and other hobbies, he was recently featured as one of *The Harvard Crimson's* Fifteen Most Interesting Seniors.

In the summer 2014, he began to make his home in Los Angeles by interning with both Fandango and the Los Angeles Dodgers on projects involving statistics and computer programming, akin to *Moneyball*. After he graduates this semester, he will be doing analytics for the Baseball Operations Department of the Dodgers. At Harvard, he writes for *The Harvard Sports Analysis Collective*.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

BZ: Like many students, I initially thought of the stereotypical Harvard student as being very academically oriented. While it is true that many Harvard students do in fact spend the majority of their time on academic pursuits, others clearly make academics a second priority behind an extracurricular, a sport, or some other passion. I think a lot of credit for this goes to the admissions office, which is clearly succeeding in its goal to craft well-balanced classes.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

BZ: The most useful class at Harvard is Data Science, a joint offering of the Computer Science and Statistics Departments that is one of the very few classes to actually teach a concrete set of skills, instead of just focusing on abstract theory and information that has little relevance outside of an academic setting. But my favorite lecturers are Michael McCormick, Francis Goblet Professor of Medieval History; Ruth Wisse, Martin Peretz Professor of Yiddish Literature and Professor of Comparative Literature; David Charbonneau, Professor of

Astronomy; and Shaye Cohen, Nathan Littauer Professor of Hebrew Literature and Philosophy in the Department of Near Eastern Languages and Civilizations — while none of these subjects were my primary area of focus, all of these lecturers were more like passionate performers than mere teachers in the classroom, and I mean that as the highest compliment.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

BZ: I tend to shop a lot of courses. And I mean a lot, always making it to over 30 courses each shopping week. The reason is that I'd always prefer to take a course with an engaging lecturer who cares deeply about his/her subject over anything else, regardless of subject material, so I have to hunt through courses in every single department to find the best ones. One time, I shopped an econometrics course in which the professor mentioned baseball statistics. This happens to be an area I'm well acquainted with, so I emailed the professor after class to respond to his comments. A couple days later, the professor put my email up on the projector and asked, "Is Ben Zauzmer here?" I was off shopping an entirely unrelated course, so needless to say, there was silence. A couple friends in the class texted me, and I bolted out of the classroom I was in and darted straight to econometrics, though of course I was way too late to answer the baseball question.

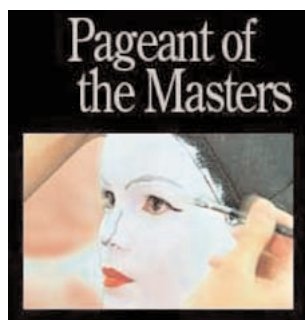
HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

BZ: For all of the complaints posed daily in the editorial pages of The Harvard Crimson, I think that Harvard is a wonderful university that gets a whole lot more right than it gets wrong. That said, if I could change one thing, it would be the strong emphasis on a very narrow set of post-graduation plans: finance, consulting, tech, fellowships, law school, med school, and business school. Each of these individually is a very worthwhile field, and many of my classmates choose these routes due to genuine passions for what they are doing. But others choose these routes because they are unwilling to look beyond the options that recruit on campus. That means the university should try and bring a wider variety of options to campus so that all students are comfortable pursuing what they are actually interested in, not just what many of their friends happen to be doing.

HCSC: What do you like most about Southern California (other than the weather)?

BZ: After 22 years of Philadelphia and Boston, the weather is indeed a major reason for my move west. But I am also very fortunate to have many wonderful friends and relatives in the area, as my dad is originally from Los Angeles. I also have a job working for the Dodgers that I am extremely excited about.
