Saturday, November 22nd: Harvard-Yale Game Viewing Party Events Happening in Inglewood, Newport Beach

Club members and their guests are invited to cheer on the Harvard Crimson as they take on the Yale Bulldogs on Saturday, November 22, in the 141st version of the Game. The event will be telecast live to viewing parties in Inglewood and Newport Beach.

The Game is one of the Harvard Club's annual signature events, offering an opportunity to reconnect with old friends and root for the fighting Crimson.

The 141st version of The Game will be held in two locations:

Inglewood: The Los Angeles-area event will be held at Cosm Los Angeles, an upscale lounge with a rooftop patio and bar. There is validated parking for up to four hours. The event is jointly sponsored with the Yale Club of Los Angeles. Doors will open at 8:45 a.m., with kickoff scheduled for 9:00 a.m. A raffle of Harvard memorabilia will be included in the ticket price of \$20 for members and \$25 for non-members. Children are welcome!

Newport Beach: The Orange County event will take place at the Elks Lodge on the Waterfront, Newport Beach, Doors will open at 8:30 a.m., with kickoff at 9:00 a.m. The ticket price is \$10 for members, \$20 for non-members, and \$55 for eligible alumni who want to purchase an event ticket and a one-year club membership.


"The Game" Viewing Party 2025 - Los Angeles

Q & A from 02138:

Wyeth Renwick '28



Wyeth Renwick '28, a sophomore in Cabot concentrating in History & Literature and Government, graduated from Marlborough School. She was the varsity captain of Marlborough's debate team, where she earned 22 bids to the Tournament of Champions and ended her career ranked as the third best Lincoln-Douglas debater in the United States, according to the National Speech and Debate Association. At Harvard, she is the Co-Director of Ideation for the Institute of Politics's John F. Kennedy Jr. Forum, where she has planned and staffed 69 speaking events at the Harvard Kennedy School: from Pete Buttigieg to the prime minister of Nepal. As a member of the Harvard Advocate's poetry board, she led the group's publicity for the nation's oldest continuously published collegiate literary magazine. In addition, she is an editori of The Harvard Crimson, a member of the technical crew for the Hasty Pudding Theatricals, and a tour guide for the Crimson Key Society. She was a research partner for Walter Jackson Bate Fellow Yxta Murray, a law professor at Loyola Law School, while Professor Murray was a resident at the Harvard Radcliffe Institute.

This summer, Renwick was awarded a Harvard Club of Southern California Summer Community Service Fellowship to work as a legal intern for the Los Angeles County Public Defender's Office. During her internship, she supported 14 attorneys on 16 felony and 2 misdemeanor cases — including 7 murders — with written, investigatory, and administrative tasks, as well as trial strategy development and client management.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

WR: I never thought being a student at Harvard would mean that I would get to meet Joe Biden, let alone as a freshman, a mere four months after he left office. Harvard has offered me such a wealth of opportunities to engage with so many fascinating people, from my classmates in Annenberg to world leaders at the Institute of Politics to my professors at the College. I am so grateful to be able to learn from all of them.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard, and what were your impressions at that time?

WR: I first visited Harvard as a rising junior in high school to move my cousin into Canaday Hall. At the time, I found the Yard's warm brick architecture and green lawns magical, despite Canaday's riot-proof design.

HCSC: What was your funniest moment at Harvard?

WR: This semester, my blockmate and I had to get from the Quad to Lowell within ten minutes for a formal event. We flagged down the shuttle, jumped on, and then had to sprint the rest of the way in our cocktail dresses across Harvard Square. Athletes on scooters cheered for us on our run, and while I was thankfully wearing sneakers, my blockmate had to take off her heels to run barefoot in the streets. (She washed her feet immediately upon returning home.)

HCSC: What were your favorite classes or professors?

WR: I loved all eight courses I took my first year, but one of my favorite courses was my first-year seminar on the history of global capitalism. Professor Sophus Reinert used Harvard Business School case studies on topics from the Sudanese civil war to Prada space suits as gateways for considering broader economic, social, philosophical, and political questions.

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

WR: There are so many fascinating courses that I wish I could fit into my schedule ---- I genuinely fell into mourning when I realized I could not take a biology

course on the evolution of primates' social behavior --- and I dread the idea of only getting to take thirty-two Harvard courses. As President of Harvard, I would expand the ability for alumni to access or audit Harvard courses, and I would try to get Harvard's very intelligent STEM people to figure out a way to expand the 24-hour day.


HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather, food and family)?

WR: Honestly, I miss the long car rides. So many of my best memories were thanks to Los Angeles traffic --- learning the entire soundtrack of Adele's "25" album with my mother and sisters, chatting with friends on the way back from school, reading books on the school bus.



HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

WR: Los Angeles will always be my home. I want to pursue a career in public interest law, and I have always planned to return to Southern California in order to help support the most vulnerable members of my community as a civil rights lawyer.
