

Q&A from 02138:

Daniel Gottesman '22



Daniel Gottesman '22, a concentrator in Government, was born in Los Angeles and graduated from Palisades Charter High School. At Pali, he created the Civic Speakers program, which connects civil servants to students across the Los Angeles area (CivicSpeakers.org). He was the drum major of the marching band, which won a Southern California state championship, the president of the school's Junior Statesmen of America chapter, and a captain of the Science Bowl team. He is a sophomore residing in Currier House. At Harvard, he is active in the Institute of Politics, serves as the policy director for the Alexander Hamilton Society, and plays on the quidditch team. Last summer, Daniel interned in the office of LAUSD School Board member Nick Melvoin '08, played trombone with the Palisades HS alumni marching band, and traveled with family.

Note: This interview was conducted before Harvard decided to go virtual.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

DG: I'm always amazed by how accessible faculty members are to students. I feel extremely fortunate to have the opportunity to meet with all of these incredible professors.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

DG: I toured Harvard as a junior in high school and was surprised by the way that the campus managed to be picturesque and peaceful while maintaining its accessibility to such an incredible city. Fortunately, this assessment has held true during my time as a student.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

DG: This is a truly impossible question! Among my favorites have been some of the classes that I've taken at the Kennedy School, which were taught by former White House advisors and experienced campaign managers.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

DG: One time, after a friend cancelled our lunch plans at the last second, I was walking out of the restroom and stumbled into a talk by D.C. Circuit Court Judge Merrick Garland! In a remarkably lucky turn of events, I received free lunch at the event, too.

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather and family)?

DG: As an avid hiker, I miss the Santa Monica Mountains whenever I'm back on campus. There's nothing like their remarkable foliage, views, and (remarkably convenient) location!

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

DG: At the moment, I plan to return! If for some reason these plans don't pan out, you will still find me wearing sunglasses and flip flops far too often wherever I wind up.

The following two questions were asked after the pandemic:

HCSC: How was your transition to online learning in the last spring semester?

DG: I found it to be surprisingly smooth, given the circumstances. My professors were extremely understanding and adapted very well, even holding Zoom versions of complicated in-class activities like foreign policy simulations. The students and staff all tried hard to preserve a sense of normalcy as best we could. It was comforting to feel like I was taking a piece of Harvard home with me.

HCSC: What are your plans for the fall semester?

DG: I am taking a leave of absence for the fall semester and working two virtual internships at groups combating political polarization. One is research-oriented, and the other trains Congressional staffers and state legislators on negotiating in more bipartisan ways. I'm hoping that, through these programs, I can make a dent in our divisive politics during my time off.
