Assembly since 2022. He is a former Executive Director of Equality California, the largest LGBTQ+ civil rights organization in California. He is a past president of the California League of Conservation Voters.



The 2024 Excellence in Education Award will be presented to Deborah Prothrow-Stith MD '79, a public health educator and dean of the College of Medicine at Charles R. Drew University of Medicine and Science in South Los Angeles. Dr. Prothrow-Stith previously served as the Hen-

Associate Dean at Harvard School of Public Health, where she created the Division of Public Health Practice. She is a former Commissioner of Public Health for Massachusetts.

Q & A from 02138: David Arkow '24



David Arkow '24, a concentrator in Economics with a secondary in Statistics, graduated from Harvard-Westlake High School where he was captain of the tennis team which won the CIF championship twice. He is a graduating senior residing in Cabot House.

At Harvard, Arkow was president of the Harvard Sports Analysis Collective and Vice President and Director of Consulting of TAMID Group Consulting. He was a tutor in the Economics Department and a course assistant for Sports Economics. Since freshman year, he played on the Harvard Men's Tennis Team which won the Ivy League championships for each of the past three years, and achieved the program's highest national ranking at No. 6 in 2024. His senior thesis, "Serving Sweet Spot" is a statistical and strategic analysis of the risk-reward trade-off of shot selection in professional tennis.

He was recognized as an ITA Scholar Athlete and a John Harvard Scholar. In his summer after junior year he worked at Deloitte Consulting in New York as a Summer Strategy Scholar, and he will be returning full-time after graduation. The prior summer, he worked at a sports betting startup in New York. His brother, Andrew Arkow '27, will reside in Pforzheimer House.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

DA: I was surprised by the very friendly nature of all the students. When I entered, I was expecting that Harvard would be a lot more cutthroat with people being very competitive. My peers are still very driven, but everyone is rooting for each other and is very supportive.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard, and what were your impressions at that time?

DA: The first time I recall visiting Harvard was in fifth grade on my elementary school's trip to Boston. I don't remember much from that trip, but I have a photo of the John Harvard statue. I visited again my junior year of high school, and I remember it being gloomy, cold, and rainy (and in March). But that time I remember walking around the campus with all of the historic buildings and lively students, and I felt a real energy to the campus. Even if the weather wasn't great (and it definitely got worse), the fact that I was still enjoying my visit that much was a good sign.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

DA: My funniest moment at Harvard was meeting my multivariable calculus professor, Noam Elkies, for the first time in-person after having had a class with him on Zoom. He was a national chess master and a chess composer (I still don't know what that is), and he was the youngest tenured professor in modern Harvard history at age 26. He was a math prodigy so I had no idea what he was doing teaching a relatively intro course. Nevertheless, I was eating with some friends in the Lowell House Dining Hall, and he asked to sit next to our group. I could tell he did not recognize me and waited until the end of the conversation to ask if he remembered. He said, "Oh yes of course I remember, you just look much different than on your tiny Zoom screen." He definitely did not remember!

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

DA: An interesting idea my friends and I discuss is having all sophomores live in the Quad. Having lived in the Quad all 4 years, including as a freshman, I have really enjoyed the experience and while most first-years dread being Quaded, if everyone in your class lived there for one year I think people would really appreciate the Quad and it would lose its stigma. If they liked the Quad, they could stay for their next two years but if they wanted to live in a River House, they could leave after one year. And, I would make EC 10 (Introductory Economics) a mandatory class.

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather, food and family)?

DA: I miss the suburban sprawl. A term I have come to use when describing SoCal to friends at Harvard is the city's "micro-pockets." You can drive 10-15 minutes and be in a completely different area, whether you drive from Santa Monica to Beverly Hills, or West Hollywood to Downtown -- each is its own destination, and each has a unique feel. Or you can drive 60-90 minutes (depending on traffic) and be in a whole new city, whether it be Santa Barbara, Orange County, or San Diego.

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

DA: Although I am going to NYC after graduation, as a lot of other Harvard undergrads do, I am confident that I will likely find my way back to SoCal later in life. Talking with my other SoCal friends at Harvard, I'd say a substantial majority want to move back long-term, which seems pretty high if you compare it to other major cities. While I grew up in West LA, I'd be open to exploring other parts of SoCal as there is so much to offer. Can't beat the warm weather for year-round outdoor tennis!
