Q&A from 02138... Devon Newhouse

(These interviews are a regular contribution to the HCSC Newsletter and will spotlight students enrolled at Harvard who are from Southern California)

Devon Newhouse '13 was born in Los Angeles. She graduated from Mayfield Senior School in Pasadena where she ran cross country and served as editor of the school newspaper. Newhouse, a History of Science concentrator and Currier House resident, volunteers in the First-Year Outdoor Program ("FOP") leading backpacking trips to orient about 400 freshmen and 100 upper classmen into the New England backcountry for a week where her main assignment was ordering and organizing the food. She served on the FOP Steering Committee. She is the daughter of George B. Newhouse, Jr. '76 (Kirkland House), former president of the Harvard Club of Southern

California and current vice-president of membership, and Maura Thorpe, and sister to Denny Newhouse '11 (Adams House), Caitlin Newhouse '10 (Dunster House), and James Newhouse, a sophomore at Boston College. Her plans following graduation are to traveto South Asia, either India or Bangladesh.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

DN: I first visited during my dad's 25th reunion. I figured it was a place where you got to go do fun things (like amusement parks) see cool things (like Yo-Yo Ma playing at the Boston Pops) and eat as much sugary cereal as you could ever want! Life as a Harvard student involves all three of those things.

HCSC: What was your favorite class and why?

DN: I took a two-person History of Science graduate student seminar on Empire and Environment last spring with a great professor. I t was a very challenging course, (and because there was only one other student in the class I couldn't slack on any of the work) but I learned so much. It also informed much of my thesis research!

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

DN: Definitely moving back. Boston is great, and I've loved my time at Harvard, but I am a Californian through and through.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

DN: My freshman fall, my two older sisters and I all took a government class together. It was not a large class, and the professor — more or less knew all the students, and thought it was quite amusing that she had three sisters who were taking her class—and that we w ould sit all together, in the same row each week. One week, much to our chagrin, she made a comment about "... the Newhouse girls, sitting in the third row!"

HCSC: Did your older sisters give you advice on how to navigate your experience at Harvard, and, if so, elaborate.

DN: So much so! Both sisters played huge roles in guiding my development. I remember once towards the beginning of freshman year, Denny sat down with me and just showed me how to look up books and articles on Hollis, the library portal. It was such a small thing, but it was so helpful and indicative of the sort of things I never had to worry about figuring out on my own. Since then, that isomething I always offer to show my freshman advisees in the Peer Advising Fellow program, where I have 9 freshmen advisees whom I meet with and c heck in about academics, dorm, and extracurricular life.

HCSC: How do you think the Harvard experience was different for you and your sisters as compared to when your dad was a student? **DN:** I think a lot about computers, for one thing. It would be difficult, if not impossible, for me to go through the day without us ing computers or internet. That, and sometimes I think about how social interactions would be different without cell phones and textin g. Would a person call her friend's room to set up a lunch or dinner date?

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

DN: I would put much more of an emphasis on Pre-orientation and leadership development programs like FOP.

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California?

DN: I miss the chaparral environment. Even though the New England backcountry is beautiful – and I love leading backpacking trips - it is a different kind of beauty. Surrounded by greenery and trees, I find myself wishing for the subtle browns and golds of my San G abriel and San Bernardino mountains.

HCSC: What was your senior thesis topic?

DN: I wrote about the Los Angeles Aqueduct—a topic really close to home! I looked at how depictions of the landscapes of the Mojave desert and Owens Valley in the Los Angeles Times affected decisions that were made about the land. In my thesis I argued that Ios Angeles had (and probably still has) a complicated relationship to nature in 1905. They saw what they were doing in terms a conquest ofnature—that nature was something that needed to be fought, tamed, and exploited—and they wrote about it in this way. At the same time, Los Angeles saw itself as a city where people could return to nature—in the form of citrus groves, poppy fields, and snow capped mountains in the background. Thus, the Los Angeles Times accounts of the aqueduct were particularly interesting and contradictory. While sometimes they referred to the "army of workers" and "aqueduct generals" who were battling the mountains and desert, other times they spoke of restoring nature through the building of the aqueduct. (Editor's Note: Newhouse turned in her thesis days before answering these question s)


