## Harvard President Drew Faust Visits Los Angeles

On the final stop of her farewell-to-alumni tour, Harvard President Drew Gilpin Faust appeared before a sold-out audience of over 450 alumni and guests at The Ebell of Los Angeles on February 15, 2018. Billed as "An Evening with President Faust," the event was co-sponsored by the Harvard Club of Southern California, Harvardwood, and the Harvard Alumni Association, and featured the outgoing university president in conversation with Pulitzer Prize-winning author and USC professor Viet Thanh Nguyen (a Radcliffe Institute Fellow in 2009). President Faust will be stepping down as Harvard's 28th president following this year's commencement, at which point she will welcome her just-announced successor, Lawrence Bacow JD '76, MPP '76, PhD '78, the current president of Tufts University.

Harvardwood Executive Director Dona Le '05 introduced the program, pointing out her personal connection to Nguyen's writing about the Vietnamese-American experience, noting that her parents, who were in the audience, were Vietnamese boat people themselves. HCSC President Steven Arkow '84 then introduced the guests of honor and presented President Faust with a Los Angeles Dodgers jersey, personalized on the back with "FAUST"

28." The discussion between Faust and Nguyen began with their shared experiences as scholars writing about the legacy of wars and the lasting memory in the communities they affect. For Faust, growing up in the still-racially segregated Virginia, it was the American Civil War. For Nguyen, it was the Vietnam War.

The conversation continued with a reminiscence of Faust's time as president of Harvard, including her accomplishments in the job (increased financial aid, online learning, and arts initiatives); the work still to be done (expansion of Harvard's physical campus); her future plans, both personal and professional (catching up on reading history and writing her pre-Harvard memoirs); commentary on the limits of higher education ("Educators have to be able to apply the narrowness of their field to the generalness of the audience"); her social media presence ("I don't Tweet but I do have an Instagram account"); and even a few writing tips ("Read a lot.") Her concluding thought was a reiteration of a comment she has made before that likely indicates her own current state of mind: "Harvard, you never get over it."

## HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?


MP: Every practice I have with the swim team has a new funniest moment. The girls are hilarious and we always have so much fun together singing and laughing on deck.
