Harvard Club in Southern California Provides L.A. Wildfire Online Hub

The Harvard Club of Southern California, in recognition of the devastating impact of the wildfires on many of our members and the greater community, has compiled an online hub that provides our latest vetted resources, references, links, and expertise.

Organizers Glenn Nano '98 and Paul Bokota '87 have formed a Wildfire Assistance Committee to aid those in need of assistance. They and their group have worked with the Club's board and Harvardwood, the Shared Interest Group, to identify crucial resources to aid community members requiring financial assistance; temporary housing; and help with property loss, damage, and recovery.

The team aims to add additional experts and resources in the coming weeks. Club members will be informed via email of added assistance. "This will be an ongoing and iterative initiative to help folks over time," said Glenn Nano.

The group is planning to build on the existing resources and to host video chats and Q&As led by experienced experts.


January Fiction Workshop

In late January, 2024, four new and returning fiction writers met for a fiction workshop at Play Coffee in Old Towne Orange. Alumni discussed each other's drafts and authors from Jane Austen to Isaac Asimov. Drafts ranged in genre from young-adult fantasy to semi-autobiographical epistolary. The HCSC fiction community has expanded to over 20 members since the first workshop in October and currently offers asynchronous monthly reading discussions and writing challenges in addition to in-person workshops. Q&A from 02138: Sophia Madrigal '26



Sophia Madrigal '26 is pursuing dual concentrations in English and Psychology at Mather House. She is an enrolled member of the Cahuilla Band of Indians with Turtle Mountain Chippewa heritage. Originally from San Diego, Sophia graduated from the Orange County School of the Arts, where she was a member of the El-Erian Acting Conservatory. In 2023 Sophia received the Yale University Misty Upham Award for Young Native Actors and was a finalist for the Orange County Artist of the Year in Theater in 2022. In high school, she founded the Luke Madrigal Indigenous Storytelling Nonprofit and now co-directs it alongside her sister, Isabella Madrigal (Harvard '24), reflecting their shared dedication to preserving Indigenous narratives. Sophia additionally received the Ms. Foundation Free to Be You and Me award in 2024, further acknowledging this commitment.

Passionate about revitalizing Cahuilla and Ojibwe (Anishinaabe) stories, Sophia began her journey in storytelling at 16 with her first screenplay, "Wildflower: Indigenous Spirit." Inspired by her father and Anishinaabe traditions, the film received the top Girl Scouts USA Gold Award in Orange County in 2021.

Since she was 14, Sophia has co-directed and produced the original Cahuilla play "Menil and Her Heart," written by her sister. This play addresses the global epidemic of missing and murdered Indigenous women and two-spirit people. Some of the play's most notable performances occurred at Yale University and the California State Capitol in 2023 in an event that culminated in \$12 million in program funding to address this issue. Sophia is currently co-directing the feature- film adaptation of the play with her sister.

Sophia interned with Assembly Member James Ramos (D-San Bernardino) this last summer, contributing to a bill named in her father's honor that aims to protect Native American children. She also received funding to study Shakespearean acting at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts in London.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

SM: Among the many revelations I encountered at Harvard, the remarkable diversity within each classroom was particularly striking. The wide range of ages and varied backgrounds among my peers offered a breadth of perspectives that consistently expanded my understanding of the world. My time at Harvard has been an invaluable opportunity for profound engagement, where each interaction facilitated new experiences and deepened intellectual connections, uncovering insights and viewpoints that expanded my previous understanding.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard, and what were your impressions at that time?

SM: The first time I visited Harvard was to see my older sister, who was already enrolled as a student there. I was deeply impressed by the campus and the intellectual vitality that Harvard prides itself on. Witnessing my sister's achievements at such an institution filled me with a sense of admiration and pride.

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

SM: If I were President of Harvard, my foremost priority would be to cultivate a more inclusive environment, with a particular emphasis on enhancing access to the arts and acting. Acting, in my view, is an exploration of our shared humanity and a profound means of understanding our place in the world. My aspiration is that every student would have the opportunity to engage with the arts in an intellectual way, as it is through this engagement that we gain deeper insights into ourselves. During my time at Harvard, I have been committed to advancing an Indigenous arts and careers pathway, fostering opportunities that bridge cultures and perspectives through the transformative power of the arts!

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather, food and family)?

SM: I really miss the fact that I could drive an hour and end up at the beach, then turn around and be at the snowy mountains, and if I felt adventurous, head off to the desert. I also have a soft spot for those drives in my family's gray truck, where I'd spoil my golden retriever with a pup cup.

HCSC: What was your funniest moment at Harvard?

SM: So, I thought I was having a severe allergic reaction—classic me, always turning a sneeze into a medical emergency. I called for help in a panic, and the paramedics showed up like they were defusing a bomb. My proctor, bless his heart, was in training to become a doctor, so he barged into my room and started spinning around like he was conducting an emergency orchestra, barking orders for the medics to give me oxygen, as if I were seconds away from ascending to heaven. Then, as the paramedics started prepping me for transport, they said I needed to go with them. Cue the dramatic exit: I was wheeled out on a stretcher like a VIP at the Oscars, right through the middle of Harvard Yard. My face turned so red I looked like a human stop sign. And here's the kicker: After all that, it turned out I wasn't having an allergic reaction at all, just a minor itch. So, I got to make a grand exit and come back to campus as the poster child for 'How to Turn a Minor Issue Into a Major Scene.' Mortified? Sure. Hilarious? Absolutely. It's a good thing I can laugh about it now—because everyone else definitely is!



HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

SM: Southern California is my home and the ancestral homeland of my tribe, the Cahuilla people. Following my time at Harvard, I intend to return to California to pursue a career in the arts, as it stands as a vibrant epicenter of artistic expression. My aspiration is to elevate Native representation in cinema, contributing to a more nuanced and authentic portrayal of Indigenous experiences on the screen.
