Harvard Admissions Update

Admissions to the Class of 2023 were sent out on March 28. As with last year, new records were set as we saw the highest number of applicants and lowest acceptance rate in the history of Harvard College. Including Early Action, Harvard received 43,330 applications and accepted 4.5% of the students applying, making this the second year in a row the rate has dipped below 5%. Southern California had approximately 2,918 applicants this year. 50 were accepted in the EA process (out of 312) and 43 were accepted in the regular decision process, for an overall acceptance rate out of 3.2%, well below the 4.5% worldwide average.

William R. Fitzsimmons '67, Dean of Admissions and Financial Aid, said, "The Class of 2023 is remarkably accomplished and promising by any standard. Reading their applications and getting to know these individuals through their unique experiences and talents inspires great confidence for the future of Harvard College and our society." According to the *Harvard Gazette*, the Class of 2023 represents a diverse mix of students, with every state represented, as well as 89 countries. Ethnic groups seeing an increase in acceptances over last year include Asian-Americans, LatinX, Native American, and Native Hawaiian,

while African-American and First Generation students saw modest declines. Women and men are equally represented in the incoming class.

On April 14, Harvard Club of Southern California board member Dan Medina '79, MBA '83 and his wife Laura Martin MBA '83 hosted a reception for several dozen admitted students and their families at their Pasadena-area home. Joined by many of the admissions interviewers, the students met future classmates, asked questions of alumni, and enjoyed a beautiful afternoon. The day before that, Orange County admits also enjoyed meeting each other at an event held in Newport Beach. On April 26-28, the College will host "Visitas," the annual gathering of accepted and still-undecided students, with final decisions due May 1st.

The application process for the Class of 2024 will begin in the late summer. Alumni interested in interviewing applicants in the fall of 2019 should email Harry Kim '86 at hhwk@yahoo.com.

Q&A from 02138: Haley Bowe '19



Haley Bowe '19, a concentrator in neuroscience, was born in Orange and graduated from Irvine High School. She was a three-year varsity starter on the water polo team as a utility player, was the team leader in goals her junior and senior years, and competed on the varsity swim team for four years. She was selected for First Team All-Pacific Coast League in water polo her senior year. Haley was the founder and president of the school's "Be a Hero, Become a Donor" club, where students volunteered at bone marrow donor registry events and raised awareness for the cause. She is now a senior at Harvard residing in Kirkland House. She is a varsity water polo player, serves on the Neurobiology Undergraduate Society events committee, and volunteers as an English tutor for PBHA's Chinatown ESL program.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

HB: The most surprising thing about Harvard for me has been the people. When I first got to campus I was expecting to find classmates who were all antisocial geniuses and professors who were even more extreme. Thankfully, I couldn't have been more wrong, and Harvard has given me some of my most treasured friendships with peers and teachers alike.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

HB: I first visited Harvard as a high school senior on my water polo recruit trip, which was a unique way to experience a campus for the first time. Some girls on the team gave me a tour, and I had to make a conscious effort not to let my jaw hang open the entire time. It seemed like a fairy-tale place, and that once I left I'd come to my senses and realize none of it really existed. Needless to say, I knew it was where I wanted to be.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

HB: Here, I have to give a shout out to the whole Chinese department and Professor Emily Huang in particular. I went to Chinese school all through childhood, and like most kids forced to do extra school, I hated every second of it. Taking Chinese at Harvard was the last thing I expected to find myself doing, but now I can't imagine my life without this incredible family. It has since given me lifelong friendships and completely redefined my relationship to my cultural heritage.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

HB: Gosh, how am I supposed to choose just one?!

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

HB: If I was President of Harvard, I would hope to increase the number of spaces centered around female empowerment. As an athlete especially, I've been privileged to be surrounded by strong female role models every day, and know of the magic that can happen when powerful women have a space to come together.

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather and family)?

HB: There's a certain openness to Southern California that I miss. At the risk of sounding clichéd, I miss driving by the ocean with the windows down and the music up, and being ten minutes from the beach and looking up to see snow on the mountains in the distance. Everything just seems bigger and wider and warmer, in a way that sounds extremely inviting when you're tripping through cold slush on your way to class in the middle of the semester.

HCSC: What are your plans after graduation?

HB: This summer after graduation I'll be spending time at home with family, and most likely coaching some neighborhood swimming as well. Beyond that, I'm hoping to work in clinical research for a couple years before pursuing medical school.

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

HB: As much as I love Southern California, I don't know if I'm ready to go back just yet. It's easy to imagine raising a family there, but for now at least, I'm enjoying being here in the Northeast.
