Q&A from 02138: Diana Agdashian '22



Diana Agdashian '22 was born and raised in Glendale, California. She graduated as valedictorian from Ribét Academy and was the recipient of the Headmaster's Award. At Ribét, Diana was student body president, competed in county and state science fairs, and was also heavily involved in speech and debate. During her high school years, she interned for Congressman Adam Schiff, worked in the Burbank City Benefits Department, rose to the rank of Sergeant in the Burbank Police Explorer Program, and published a children's novel. A sophomore in Cabot House, Diana is presently on the executive board for both Harvard's and Boston's Armenian Students Association. She is also the former Outreach Chair for the Institute of Politics Campaign and Advocacy Program. During the summer before her second year, Diana worked as a law clerk at the Los Angeles District Attorney's Office, the nation's largest prosecutorial agency, in the Target Crimes Division. She worked closely with Deputy District Attorneys on cases involving crimes against police officers, arson, child abduction and stalking.

HCSC: What surprised you about being a student at Harvard?

DA: The main surprise would be that as a student here, I truly do feel like Harvard was able to facilitate a community around me that genuinely cares. From my amazing freshman year proctor Dan Lobo to the Dean of Harvard College, and my future Resident Dean, Rakesh Khurana, I as a student have always felt very supported by the college. Dan, from the very start of the school year, promised my entryway that he would always be there for us whether we simply needed advice for our futures or were just going through a rough patch. A promise that he has always kept. Rakesh Khurana is not only my Dean in terms of the College, but also he's the Faculty Dean of my new home, Cabot House! From just stopping him in the yard to chat about the little things to being one of the selected students to take part in the Gober Family Uncommon Fare Dinner with him and Dean Lauren Brandt, I know that he will do whatever it takes to make sure we as his students are happy and successful.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

DA: Visitas weekend was the first time I visited Harvard and I was extremely, extremely excited. I remember it being the first time I had traveled by myself and my mind was just racing with thoughts about Harvard and the million overlapping activities I had put on my already packed schedule. The first impression I had was that Harvard really wanted to prevent students from coming in with already established ideas before even stepping on campus. As new students, we automatically came in with preconceived notions of what we expected Harvard to be. I understood during Visitas that Harvard wants you to make your time here your own, rather than what you think it needs to be in order to fit some sort of mold. The College aims to facilitate growth and learning in its student body.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

DA: My favorite professor at the moment is definitely Professor Stephen Rosen who teaches Gov 1730: War & Politics. Here my interest in international relations was heightened as I learned about the many factors that

impact the relationship between war & politics. I gained a deeper understanding of some of the most decisive moments in world history by a lecturer who is truly invested in the subject. Not only is Professor Rosen an extremely engaging and experienced lecturer, but also very approachable and great to talk to.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

DA: The funniest moment at Harvard would 100% be the week leading up to the big Harvard-Yale game. It started off with a "Yale Roast" by Professor Andrew Berry which was hilarious and then just a bunch of quips about Yale pretty much everywhere from Berg to Lamont. The situation was even funnier to me because growing up in Southern California you're pretty used to the USC vs. UCLA rivalry (Fight On!) and the extreme school spirit that comes from following the football season, while here it was more so a week of making fun of Yale without really caring too much about the game.

HCSC: If you were president of Harvard, what would change?

DA: One thing that I and many other students have noticed during our first year here is that Harvard is doing its best to address some of the more delicate parts of its past and is making sure it's taking the right steps for its future. Regarding both of these aspects, students have a lot to say and often have varying opinions about what they would like to see accomplished. I think one thing that would be very beneficial would be to constantly facilitate this discussion on campus and to ensure that students and administration are able to understand one another while still explaining their own points of view. A more public format to show the discourse to students and other campuses would be advantageous.

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather and family)?

DA: The food!!! I understand that the Felipe's versus Jefe's debate is pretty big on campus and has the ability to break up friendships, but they both pale in comparison to SoCal's authentic and local cuisine.
