Q & A from 02138:

Josie Abugov '23



Josie Abugov '23, resides in Kirkland House, is pursuing a joint concentration in Social Studies and the Studies of Women, Gender, and Sexuality. She grew up in Studio City/Sherman Oaks (calling herself "a true valley girl"). She attended Harvard-Westlake High School, where she was editor-in-chief of the Harvard-Westlake Chronicle. She spent the summer before tenth grade in a rural village in Russia and in the summer before senior year, she lived with a family in Nanjing, China through a program run by the Department of State. At Harvard, she is an editor-at-large for The Crimson's Fifteen Minutes Magazine and a Ledecky Fellow for Harvard Magazine. Before the pandemic, she had a radio show for WHRB where she played alternative and hip hop music, and was a gallery attendant at the Cooper Gallery for African and African American Art in Harvard Square. She is also affiliated with the Association of Black Harvard Women, The Signet, and Crimson Key Society. Her mother is Kelly Goode '83.

HCSC: When was the first time you visited Harvard and what were your impressions at that time?

JA: When I went to Boston with my eighth-grade class, our tour guide showed us the "whispering arch" at the entrance of Sever Hall. If two people stand on opposite sides of the entrance, face away from each other, and speak towards the layers of brick that compose the building, they'll hear every word the others says with perfect clarity. I remember speaking to my best friend Nicole across the archway and genuinely believing that it was magic. This sounds silly, but from that point on, I really did want to go to Harvard.

HCSC: What was your favorite class (or professor) and why?

JA: There are many classes that I've loved from these past four years, but Feminist Political Thought, a government lecture taught by Professor Katrina Forrester, was one of the most meaningful because it exposed me to American and European feminist ideologies that I didn't know existed. The methodological approach of this course was very powerful to me — we weren't debating the efficacy of feminism as a movement, but rather analyzing different feminist schools of thought from a philosophical standpoint. After this class, I just wanted to keep reading feminist theory, black feminist theory in particular.

HCSC: What has been your funniest moment at Harvard?

JA: There really are hilarious moments every day here — the school is dense with all sorts of characters and, even as a "super senior" who sometimes feels like I've seen it all, life at Harvard rarely feels boring. I did a profile for The Crimson on one of these characters. At the end of each school year, the magazine would usually pick 15 seniors deemed "the most interesting" of their class. But during the pandemic, the chairs decided to randomly select 15 seniors and have all the incoming editors profile them. I profiled this guy, Stephen, who had kept cockroaches in his room since he was a freshman. He told me this crazy story about how two of his cockroaches mated one summer and so he became the parent of 30 baby cockroaches, who he then tried to kill (though he called it "some circle of life stuff") by asking the Pfoho email list if anyone could loan him a lizard.

HCSC: If you were President of Harvard, what would change?

JA: With Harvard's recent divestment from fossil fuels, the administration is making meaningful strides toward combating some of the most pressing social issues, but there's obviously a long way to go. If I were the President of Harvard, I would follow the lead of the Harvard Prison Divestment Campaign and cut off financial ties with the prison industrial complex. I'd also return the contested daguerreotypes of the enslaved people in the Lanier v. Harvard case to their descendants. On a lighter note, I would expand the fruit selection in the dining hall (especially raspberries), bring back omelet stations in all the houses, and offer chicken tenders every day at lunch.

HCSC: What do you miss most about Southern California (other than the weather, food and family)?

JA: Weather, food, and family are definitely some of the biggest things I miss about home! This might be a controversial take, but I actually miss driving when I'm here in Cambridge. I certainly don't miss driving up Coldwater in the mornings to get to my high school, but I do miss listening to my favorite songs with my home friends while driving on Mulholland in the late afternoons.

HCSC: How do you think Southern California will figure into your future after Harvard?

JA: As I start searching for jobs, I'm definitely looking for opportunities in Los Angeles, even though New York is the hub of Harvard post-grad life — Harvard Part 2, as people like to call it. But whether I move back to Los Angeles after graduating, I'm very confident that I will spend a lot of time in Southern California during my lifetime. One of my very-millennial sounding goals is having a backyard sometime during my young adulthood. Maybe the lofty pursuit of a humble backyard will bring me back home.

HCSC: How did you manage the transition to virtual classes?

JA: I didn't! After I finished the Spring 2020 semester, I took a gap year. I feel very grateful that I was able to live with a few friends who were also spending the year doing various virtual internships. But for the couple months when I did do virtual classes, the painting Gen Ed course I was enrolled in made my brief stint of online learning feel worthwhile. I'm a decidedly untalented painter. I had enrolled in the course out of sheer curiosity and because I needed to complete my "Aesthetics and Culture" Gen Ed requirement. When we all got sent home in March 2020, our instructors sent us a fabulous set of painting supplies. Most afternoons that spring, I would sit and paint in the backyard. Even though my final results were not particularly sophisticated, that class gave me many moments of peace during the beginning stages of the pandemic.
